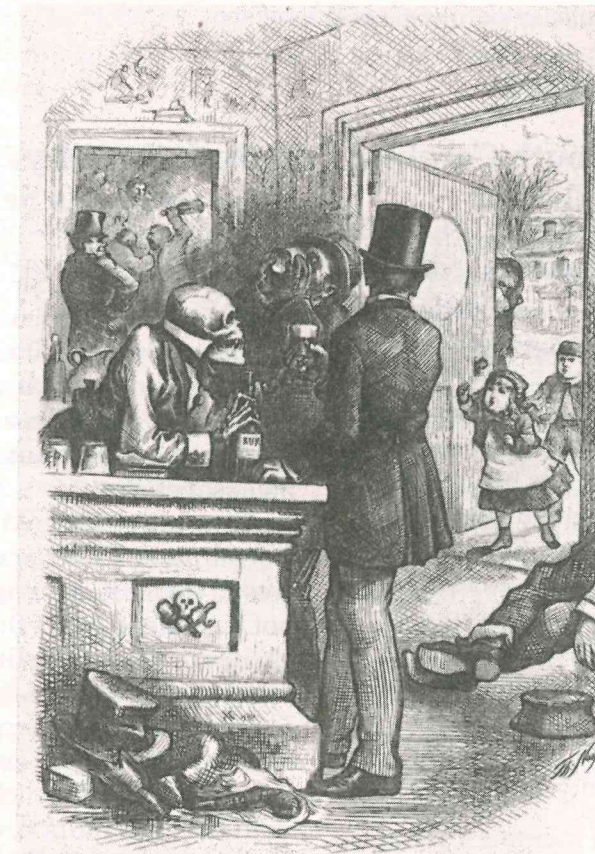


GROWTH AND REFORM

Interpreting a Political Cartoon

The temperance movement of the 1800s was spurred, in large part, by women and religious leaders. Families had long been suffering the physical and financial effects of drinkers' over-consumption. Because women did not have the right to vote, they relied on grassroots efforts to reform drinkers and to persuade lawmakers to ban the sale of alcohol. ♦ Look at the cartoon below.
